

HELLO, FLEMINGTON-RARITAN FAMILIES

As you have seen in the news and heard through friends and family in other New Jersey communities, many school districts are revising their plans for September, with several choosing to begin the year fully remote as they address challenges in different areas.

At last Monday night's Board of Education meeting, Mr. Bland and I presented an updated Return to School plan. I shared with the community the Flemington-Raritan Regional School District statement on returning with confidence to school: The Board of Education and the Superintendent believe that returning to school is an emotional topic for many families, students, staff, and faculty, especially with those hardest hit by COVID-19. I shared with the community the Return to School with Confidence Ladder to help us determine the readiness of the Flemington-Raritan Regional School District to return to a regular model of education with all students and staff in school, full days for full in-person instruction.

The Return to School with Confidence Ladder indicates a goal of opening for a limited model with schools open for staff on August 31 at Tier 2. Tier 2 is a full remote model preparing instruction for students in an all virtual remote academy every week. Our schools will remain closed to visitors but open to a greater number of staff members to teach from the classroom while students are at home learning virtually.



We are working diligently to bring our neediest special education students back to school for in-person learning beginning on September 21st. We have set the goal to bring all students back for in-person learning no later than November 1, 2020.

I have received many emails from parents and community members expressing concerns about our reopening plan in a hybrid setting without in-person learning. A remote only learning plan has brought childcare complications to many families. Parents have expressed their concern that virtual learning doesn't fully meet their child's needs and the amount of screen time is concerning. Please continue to direct your frustrations to me and be kind to your principals and teachers who are working incredibly hard to create a safe and welcoming start to the school year.

I believe we all agree; the best place for students to learn is with a certified teacher who loves kids and values the process of teaching and learning. We all look forward to the day when our students are back in classrooms, and our school hallways are filled with the voices of children. I regret the tight hold that the COVID-19 pandemic has on our schools and our entire society.

FACILITIES CARE FOR QUALITY INDOOR AIR CONDITIONS

The facilities team has been working diligently this summer to keep buildings dry and humidity levels low. The dehumidifiers and air scrubbers were in all buildings this summer. Our district has spent thousands of additional dollars on replacement fans and new fans to circulate air in classrooms and around the buildings. Facilities will be adjusting air conditioners in those areas that are air-conditioned this weekend so that by Monday, areas are cool. Maintenance has monitored the moisture and humidity levels over the summer in our buildings daily using the hygrometers. A hygrometer is a handheld multifunctional meter that allows for quick and easy analysis of environmental conditions indoors and outdoors. The district purchased multiple hygrometers last summer. We certainly did not want to have to deal with mold and mildew on top of responding to the pandemic protocols and procedures!

REFERENDUM WORK CONTINUES DESPITE THE PANDEMIC CHALLENGES

Despite pandemic challenges, referendum work continued all summer. Roof work, electrical work, circuit panel upgrades, site work for sidewalks, and parking areas were all on the "to do" list this summer. Despite construction challenges as to be expected with all construction, the referendum

projects moved forward. All roofing work at our elementary schools is in preparation for HVAC work.

Robert Hunter, Copper Hill, and Barley Sheaf Elementary Schools all had significant referendum work this summer. The three elementary schools had roof work to replace roofing and exterior fascia, soffits, and metal roof-flashing. According to the architecture group, DI Group Architecture, "The new roof system is truly a "multi-layered" system, unlike that which currently exists in most of the schools." Rich Alderiso, the architect for the referendum work, explained that the cap roofing work on our schools included an insulation top and layers of roofing membrane which get adhered to over the insulation.

Robert Hunter had significant site work with new concrete sidewalk replacement, stormwater piping installations, and asphalt repaving work. Lighting supplies were ordered and installed for the front office at Robert Hunter. The installation of a new exterior canopy outside of the front door was installed. If you drove past Robert Hunter this summer, you saw quite the assortment of construction vehicles. Dump trucks, pavers, cranes all were part of the work at Robert Hunter. The roof work required gravel embedment. Therefore the dump truck and paver were present many days. Even a crane was used to support the work on the rooftop of Robert Hunter Elementary. Metal roof-flashing, exterior soffits, and rainwater downspouts were installed around the perimeter of the roof.

In addition to roof and site work, Barley Sheaf

Elementary School had existing light fixtures removed and exterior walkway and main entrance work. There were new motion-activated L.E.D.



light fixtures that were installed. Barley Sheaf also had exterior entrance canopy light fixtures replaced.

Copper Hill's roof work continues on the weekends to install gravel on the rooftop. Some metalwork will occur on weekdays and also on the weekends.

All schools in the district had electrical work to install the new 21st Century communication system using the technology of Data Comm. Staff will notice new telephones installed in classrooms. Electrical work in all schools required exterior underground conduits and cables. The district is using partnering with JCP&L for other electrical work. As with all outdoor construction projects, almost all work is weather-dependent. Fortunately, long-range forecast (aside from the rain on the 29th) looks favorable for good weather.

STUDENT SCREENING FOR COVID-19 SYMPTOMS

As part of the New Jersey Road Back to Recovery and reopening our schools, all school districts must adopt a policy for safely and respectfully screening students and employees for symptoms of and history of exposure of COVID-19. As part of the employee screening, all employees must use a link provided by the individual school for staff and through Genesis for students. Parents must submit the screening questionnaire each day before sending students to school. I encourage you to set a reminder to help establish a new routine that we must all become accustomed to as we learn to live and work in our new normal. As we get closer to September 21st with our first group of students set to return to school, more information will arrive to parents about the procedure.


Remember, masks must be worn all day when coming into school. Prepare your children for this practice by helping to set routines as you move about the community.

NEW JERSEY DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION GUIDANCE ON SERVING MEALS WHILE SCHOOLS ARE DELIVERING HYBRID AND FULLY REMOTE INSTRUCTION

New Jersey's Governor released Executive Order 175 released on August 13, 2020, which lifted the State's requirement that schools remain closed to students for in-person instruction. On Saturday, the New Jersey Department of Education released additional guidance regarding the reopening of schools. The guidance document includes the requirements for compliance with EO 175, with directions for Superintendents to complete a Statement of Assurance and Health and Safety Status Form ensuring that schools can open safely.

One highlight from the order provided more information on the distribution of food during hybrid and remote learning instruction. The New Jersey Department of Education requires all school districts to participate in the National School Lunch and Breakfast Programs to offer the required meals to all children, regardless of eligibility, when the school day involves at least four hours of in-person or remote instruction.

The Flemington-Raritan School District is prepared to offer food to all students beginning September 8, 2020. Please review the documents that are included in this newsletter. The information is from Maschio's, our Food Service Provider.
