COVID-19 AND EXECUTIVE ORDERS

The Executive Order for masks on buses and mask in schools is reflective of the improving situation in New Jersey with COVID-19 case counts. Due to the lifting of the mask mandate, Flemington-Raritan students and staff members are no longer required to wear masks indoors beginning March 7, 2022. As of March 7, masks will no longer be required but may be worn optionally. The NJDOH is updating guidance for K-12 schools with the consideration of situations where masking would continue to be recommended, such as when there are high-levels of COVID-19 activity and/or isolation and quarantine scenarios.

TRANSPORTATION ON SCHOOL BUSES

As of February 25, the CDC lifted the requirement for wearing

masks on buses or vans operated by public or private school systems (see <u>this link</u>). At this time, our District will no longer require masks to be worn on buses.

February is the month when bus drivers are recognized and appreciated. February 22nd marked School Bus Driver Appreciation



Day. Our bus drivers are one of the most important members of the Flemington-Raritan team. Their role as a bus driver is bigger than just transporting students to and from school. They have an opportunity each day to have a positive impact on students. Sometimes it's easy for people to forget how much a bus driver contributes to the lives of students, parents, teachers, and community members. They are tasked with the critical responsibility of protecting our students each and every day. I am grateful for all our bus drivers' hard work, dedication and commitment to students and their safety.

<u>WHERE ARE WE IN OUR SCHOOLS</u> <u>CONCERNING COVID-19?</u>

As of February 28, 2022, the District has had 76 positive cases reported to the District during the month of February, compared to 485 cases in January. Overall, we have had an 84.3% decrease in the number of cases reported to the District when comparing January to February. On February 28, 2022 we only had 18 students, or .5% of our students, quarantining due to exposure to COVID-19 or symptoms of COVID-19 and participating in virtual instruction, compared to on January 5th when we had 302 students!

Governor Murphy's announcement to lift the mask mandate in schools as of March 7 has placed decisions about masking in the hands of district leaders. Since that announcement, there has been additional guidance provided by the NJ Department of Health and, as noted above, the CDC has lifted the requirement for masks on school buses. Effective March 7, the district will be mask optional for all students and staff members. As per Executive Order #253,

district staff who are unvaccinated must continue to engage in weekly COVID testing.

We are working to print signs to hang in our schools to remind students, staff, faculty, and visitors that Flemington-

Raritan Regional School District is a place where others' differences are accepted and we are especially kind to others



whose opinions and choices may be different than our own. We foster respect, civility, and kindness.

We fully expect everyone to be respectful and understanding of each person's choice to wear or not wear a mask. Teasing and bullying will not be tolerated and will be handled in accordance with our district discipline policies.

We will continue to maintain three (3) feet of physical distancing within the school setting to the greatest extent possible and we will continue to reinforce handwashing and proper health practices.
