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HELLO, FAMILIES!

The last day of school is usually bittersweet. As educators, we are pleased with all that our students have achieved over the school year and feel a great sense of accomplishment in our students' learning. Yet, there is a bit of melancholy as we think about our students leaving us either to begin their next year as high school students, as in the case with our eighth graders or to move on to the next grade level.

Our last day of school is tomorrow, Tuesday, June 23, 2020. Monday, June 22nd and Tuesday, June 23rd, are both early dismissal days from school. Use your child's school schedule for guidance on the daily schedule for these two days of school.

This year, COVID-19 has brought unprecedented challenges that have caused many of us to feel an even greater sense of melancholy. I am hopeful that with New Jersey's continuation of flattening the curve for cases of COVID-19, our reopening of businesses and establishments will continue.

RETURNING IN SEPTEMBER WITH CONFIDENCE

This week I expect to receive information from the State of New Jersey's Department of Education on guidelines to reopen our school doors. We have planned for four different scenarios for the opening of the 2020-2021 school year:

- 1. All students in our physical buildings with social distancing in place;
- Some students in physical buildings and some students virtual (An AM/PM or "A" Day/"B" Day Split Session);
- 3. All students virtual; (remote learning);
- 4. Intermittent virtual (a quick shift from in-person instruction to remote instruction).

There are four opportunities to serve for committee work. Committees will provide recommendations, concerns, and strategies to the Superintendent of Schools. The first meetings will occur the week of July 6th and organized by the Committee Chair.

- <u>Physical and Mental Health</u> (Think Tank on social distancing, counseling needs, health & safety.)

As I have information and guidelines to share, I will keep our community informed. Thank you for your patience and support.

FACILITIES, OPERATIONS AND REFERENDUM PROGRESS

The roofing company, Pravco, is proceeding steadily with the roof replacement at Barley Sheaf Elementary School. The roof

is almost finished with only a few remaining items to address. Roof-flashing abatement work, metal flashing replacement and related masonry work has been completed at Barley Sheaf Elementary School. Pravco had the benefit of



beautiful weather in the past few days.

The old brick chimney on the top of Barley Sheaf was removed. A new double-wall metal flue was installed to serve the hot water heater.



Work has been concentrated at Barley Sheaf for a few weeks but has moved to Robert Hunter for the next four weeks or so. In the coming weeks, work will shift to Robert Hunter Elementary School and Copper Hill Elementary School.



Manor II Electric has also been moving right along in their work. Installation was successful for new conduits above the ceilings in schools.



Materials for roof work have been delivered and are stored on-site of schools.

The playground at Robert

Hunter has packages of large insulation that will be placed on the rooftop. Referendum work and construction are currently ahead of schedule.




ANTI-RACISM & EQUITY RESOURCES


Two of my favorite books are the picture books, <u>Through My Eyes Ruby Bridges</u> by Margo Lundell and <u>The Story of Ruby Bridges</u> by Robert Coles. The articles and interviews in the book <u>Through My Eyes Ruby Bridges</u> were compiled by Margo Lundell. The story is all about the world of civil rights

and human rights. <u>The Story of Ruby Bridges</u> by Robert Coles is the same theme, but an appropriate text for younger students, ages 6-10. Talking with children about the courage that Ruby Bridges had as she climbed up the steps to become the black child in an all-white school can lead to discussions about other acts of courage. Conversations such as these can help children to open hearts and minds to the millions of people in our world.



Another favorite picture book is <u>Remember The Journey to</u> <u>School Integration</u> by Toni Morrison. The author collected a

treasure trove of historical photographs. I used *Through My Eyes Ruby Bridges* by Margo Lundell and *Remember The Journey to School Integration* by Toni Morrison in conversations with adolescent readers. My sixth, seventh, and eighthgraders were able to handle the conflicted emotions they felt when reading. Emotional connections with




the nonfiction characters helped readers to bring strong opinions in conversations about contentious subjects. These conversations allowed students to grow and learn about civil rights and human rights.

Both of these books spark conversations that lead to questions. I encourage families to talk together and lean on school guidance counselors for support.
